

WE ARE FORGED BY THE STORIES WE TELL.

Scots in London originates in the discovery and delight of shared stories. In 2018, for the 100th Anniversary of the Armistice, the congregation of St Columba's, Pont Street wanted to tell a powerful tale – of the hospitality shown to 50,000 transiting troops through wartime London – richly recorded in Church Magazines of the era. Unsurprisingly, other longestablished, London-based, Scottish associations had similar fascinating stories. From those conversations a series of collaborative Scots in Great War London events – musical, cultural, educational, and prayerful – were undertaken, including publication of Scots in Great War London: A Community at Home and On the Front Line 1914 – 1918.

Afterwards, our Royal Patron, The Princess Royal challenged: "What are you going to do next?" The "next" is Scots in London – launched with a Gala Evening (October 2023) and celebrated with an inaugural Ceilidh (March 2024). Scots in London brings together cultural societies, sports clubs, alumni groups, charities, churches and the Scottish military in London. We promote heritage and culture, co-ordinate members' events, support relevant charities, and seek to enhance the life of the city where we reside. Achieving together, considerably more than we can alone. Scots in London presenting the first St Andrew's Book Festival is testimony to that.

My thanks to all involved in establishing this wonderful new venture and warm welcome to all who are drawn to it. May the Festival bring engaging encounters, new perspectives, firm friendships, kindling delight and discovery - forged by the stories we tell.

To all our guest speakers and attendees, I wish you an inspiring week; wide horizons, profound perspectives and convivial companions, old and new, gifts that good books surely bring.






